## Why Choose GERMANY?

The Nursing Profession is a very respectful and in-demand profession in Germany. Germany urgently needs qualified and skilled nurses to meet the ever - increasing demand of the medical industry. As the figures speak, according to the "RWI - Leibniz institute for Economic Research", presently, 84.00 certified nurses are missing and it will touch 200.000 by the year 2030. For this main reason, the government of Germany encourages hiring certified nurses from foreign lands.



Candidate can start working from day one (not possible in USA, Canada UK Australia or New Zealand) and receive first salary within one month.

Minimum Salary with B1 German certificates 1,70,000 Rupees per month  
(From 1st month)

Minimum Salary with B2 German certificates 2,00,000 Rupees per month  
(From 1st month)

Extra Pay (up to 150%) for night, weakened & Holiday shifts.

Working hours (40 hours per week) Monday to Friday, Saturday & Sunday are off.

30 working days Holidays per year.

You are also entitled to 6 weeks of paid sick leave. Everyone who works in Germany has access to social security and its benefits like unemployment insurance, healthcare or retirement insurance.



## Eligibility Criteria (to work as a Nurse in Germany)

Program completed as a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing or a General Nursing Midwifery Holder or a Master's Degree in Nursing.

German language B2 level certificate from GOETHE/TELC/OSD

### Academic Development

Hospital will provide you free classes to improve your theory and practical knowledge along with German language (B2 Level). Your hospital will provide you option to do post Basic B.Sc. or M.Sc. in Nursing within the hospital free of cost and you will get full pay during your studies.

If you want to take on new tasks, change specialization, or gain more responsibilities, there is a wide range of further training courses available in Germany. (Qualifications you can get qualification in over 200 different fields).

Nurses with vocational qualifications have several job opportunities in the following fields:

- a Anaesthesia and intensive care.
- a Operations and endoscopy.
- a Oncology.
- a Clinical Geriatrics.
- a Rehabilitation and long-term care.
- a Palliative and hospice care.
- a Hygiene.
- a Nephrology.
- a Psychiatric care.



If you want you can always change your profession after you get PR (Permanent Residency) most of the Nurses go to become Doctors, Flight Cabin crew or Pilots. (Government Provides free education to all PR holders)

## Submit Documents

We will get your relevant documents Apostille from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

We will send the document to Germany for German translation.

Start learning the German language A1, A2 B1 & B2.

You submit a B2 Certificate.

We arrange an interview with Hospital via video conference.

We apply on your behalf for nursing registration in one of the nursing councils the process takes 1-3 months.

**Note:** There are 16 states in German and each states has its own nursing council.

You receive a job contract from Hospital

We apply for Visa Appointment at German Embassy.

You appear for Visa interview at German Embassy.

You get your visa stamped on your passport.

You fly to Germany.

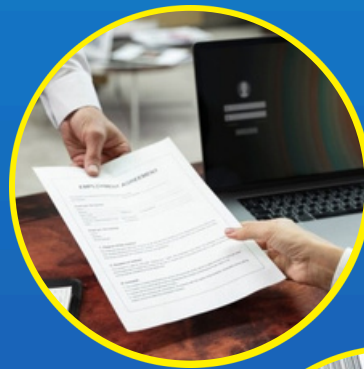
You land in Germany.

We pick you up from Airport.

We take you to your accommodation/hospital.

You start working on the date mentioned on your job contract letter.

After 30 days you get your first salary





## Permanent Settlement in GERMANY

You will receive TR (temporary residency) within first month of landing in Germany and PR (permanent residency) after 33 months of working in Germany with German TR you can visit all 26 Schengen countries of European Union and with PR you can live and work in any in Schengen countries Europe Union. After 5 years you are eligible for German passport.

## Family

You can bring your spouse and children to Germany 3 months after you arrive in Germany. For moving to Germany, your spouse need a German language certificate of A1 level.

If your spouse and they can study (Education is 100% free of cost in Germany from kinder garden to PHD even in private coaching institute) and work or simply start at home.

Your spouse and children will also get TR, PR & German Citizenship along with you. Maternity / parental level 12 months of paid leave to mother and 2 months of paid leave to father.

Parents with children will 18,500 rupees (219 euros) per month per child from government until 18 years of age.

Child born in German are considered as German Citizen.

Your children will get free Education (Education is 100% free of cost in Germany kinder garden to PHD even in private coaching institute).



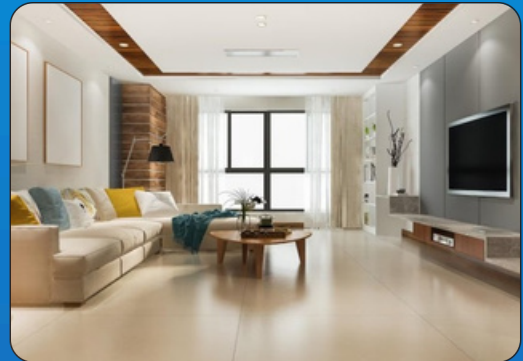
## Life in GERMANY

How much money do you need to live in Germany? Rental costs vary across the country, but you will likely need in excess of €600 a month to cover rent, bills, transport and food. Draw up a realistic budget so you know how much you will need to earn.



## Renting an Apartment in Germany

You will often need to pay up to three months' rent and a deposit in advance in order to rent an apartment, so make sure you have enough savings. Also, budget for Nebenkosten: additional monthly payments to cover fees, refuse, internet, and other bills. The amount you will pay per month for an apartment before bills and Nebenkosten will be referred to as cold or kaltmiete.



## Meeting People in Germany

Most Germans belong to one or more clubs or groups; in fact, they have one of the highest levels of social cohesion in the world, so joining a group can be a great way to find like-minded friends. The fastest way to meet new people, however, will likely be through your studies or your job.



## Transportation in Germany

If you expect to use national, regional, and local trains or buses regularly, then purchase a Bahn Card 50 to take advantage of 50% off fares. Students in Germany can also enjoy free or discounted train travel within a certain region by acquiring a Semester ticket.





## Always take your ID with you

Always remember to keep your Residence permit card (eAT) and/or ID or Passport with you and keep a paper copy at home. Germans are expected to carry their national identity card with them at all times, but for foreign nationals an eAT will suffice.



## The German "Pfand" System

The Pfand system in Germany means that consumer pay a deposit on glass and plastic bottles, which they get back when they return the bottle. Not all shops will accept all empty bottles, however. They will only accept bottles which they sell in store. So, collect them up and take them to a supermarket, as these tend to sell/accept most bottles, provide they have a German Pfand barcode and this way, you 'll get a mini wind fall of change!



## Medical Care in Germany

To access medical care in Germany, you need to register with the state healthcare system (Gesetzliche Krankenversicherung). Once registered, you will be given health card (Krankenversicherung) which you need to take to any appointment or visit to the hospital.

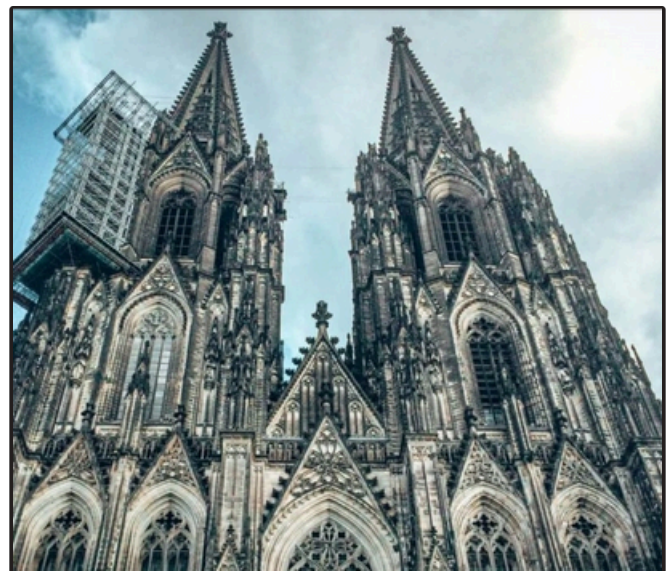


## Night life in Germany
